Service of The Great O Antiphons December 17

During this season of Advent, our church's traditions are rich with words, music, and symbols directing us to wait and prepare for the good news of the birth of a Savior and the great joy that

will restore our broken lives. On December 17, the third Sunday of Advent, our service will be based on The

Great O Antiphons.

Originating in the twelfth century Christian church, these antiphons are based on the familiar Latin hymn O Come, O Come, Emmanuel, (translated by John Mason Neale). They are actually a set of medieval refrains used before and after the singing of Mary's Song, the Magnificat, and were sung on each of the seven days before Christmas. Each refrain or petition begins with "O" and asks Jesus to come and save us. Using titles given to Christ in the Old Testament, they reflect Israel's yearning for the Messiah, and they help us express our own hopes and expectations as we wait for his return.

On December 17, cantors will sing each of these antiphons as handbells toll. Our worship will also include a collection of thought provoking and inspirational readings, taken from the book *The Mystery of*

Holy Night by Dietrich Bonhoeffer (1906 – 1945). Born in Berlin, Bonhoeffer served as pastor, teacher, and theologian during one of

the most difficult times in history for church leaders. In 1933, he helped form the "Confessing Church," and in response to Hitler being named "Fuhrer" announced that only Christ could be the leader of the church. Bonhoeffer spent the last two years of his life in prison, and in 1945 was tragically executed just three weeks before American forces liberated the area.

Following each of Bonhoeffer's readings, we will all join in singing a hymn or carol that reflects each particular theme. In addition, Bergstrasse's Festival Choir will sing *Good News*, an early American fuguing tune, arranged by James Boeringer and Hark, Now, O Shepherds, a Czechoslovakian carol arranged by Marie Pooler. Joyous Praise Handbells, along with tambourine and drum, will play an arrangement of the familiar Advent hymn *Come, Thou Long-Expected Jesus* arranged by Cathy Moklebust. And, a hymn setting of *The King Shall Come When Morning Dawns* by Robert Powell will be played by flute and organ.

Seven banners, depicting a symbol for each of the seven O Antiphons and reflecting the traditional seasonal color of purple, will be hung in the sanctuary. These symbols include the **Menorah** for Wisdom, the **Burning Bush** for Law, the **Rose of Bethlehem** for Hope, the **Key of David** for the Redeemer, the **Rising Sun** for the Light of the World, the **Crown** for the Prince of Peace, and the **Creche** for Emmanuel.

Come pray, sing, listen, and prepare as we hear the good news and welcome the Savior into our lives. Invite a friend to come receive this immeasurable gift of love, come down to us at Christmas.

Rejoice! Rejoice! Emmanuel shall come to you, O Israel.

broadside thoroughly used up, totally worn out and proclaiming, 'What a ride!' Our working together, our serving together, our worshiping together, our study and learning together, and our loving of others together has been quite a ride. Lean on each other; draw hope, strength, and love from each other. Know that as the lighting of candles in the darkened sanctuary on Christmas Eve dispels the darkness of an uncertain and changing future, your future will surely move toward the light of the world. So, "let your light continue to shine before others that they may see your good works and give glory to the Father in heaven."



Christmas Eve Worship Service 7:15 PM


Come and celebrate the Nativity of Our Lord with a service of word, sacrament, and song beginning at 7:15 p.m. on Sunday, December 24. Our worship will include readings from the prophet Isaiah and from Luke's gospel, and we will sing many of the church's beloved Christmas carols.

Joyous Praise Handbells will begin our Christmas Eve festival by playing an arrangement by Hart Morris of a German carol originally written in 1625 and entitled While by My Sheep. You'll want to listen closely as handbells and chimes express the shepherds' awe and excitement upon hearing the angels' glad tidings. These instruments echo the song's refrain: Joy, joy,

joy. How great my joy! Next, we'll hear Donna Daub sing When Love Was Born by Mark Schultz. This seasonal favorite will surely fill us with the wonder of this Holy Night. And, our Senior Choir's offertory anthem, Sing to the Child by K. Lee Scott, is an original composition that compels us to lift our voices with those of the angels and shepherds to welcome and praise the Lord of Love.

Following the sacrament of Holy Communion will be the traditional Christmas Eve candlelighting as the congregation sings Silent Night. Everyone is invited to attend and join with all God's people to worship and celebrate the birth of the Christ Child.



Mitten Tree for Vantage




Saturday, December 9


