

Souper Bowl Sunday

Our normal total snowfall average for a year is 30.6 inches. The recent Blizzard of 2016 produced 30.2 inches all in one super-storm. As I write this, I am still not dug out, but otherwise, we are weathering the event in pretty good fashion.

In today's world, many people fail to respect the weather and its power to please and challenge. When the reports of the possible magnitude of this blizzard of 2016 were being broad-cast, I began planning for the possibility that we might lose power. Living in a rural area means when the power goes off, I lose heating, lighting, and most importantly water. I have a well that needs electricity to run a pump to provide water. It's a very strong well, but without electricity to power the pump, I have <u>no</u> water. So I prepared for this possibility by filling large containers with water for general use and drinking.

For the possible loss of electricity for lighting, I have battery operated lanterns and flashlights in storage. So I pulled them out of storage and checked the batteries. They were getting low, so I made a trip to the hardware store for new ones. As for heating, we have a gas fireplace to heat the house and kerosene stoves for the garage.

Next, I checked my fuel supplies for the snow blower and lawn tractor. That meant another trip, this time to the gas station to fill reserve gas cans. It was also time to put the snow plow on the lawn tractor, so that it would be ready for plowing the drive way. (As it turned out the monster storm lived up to its name, and my plow was too small to move so much snow. So, I had to call in reinforcements.)

I share this little scenario as a kind of parable of our life of faith. We know that life can be filled with many storms and rough times. There are monster storms, and we would do well to help prepare for them. God in Jesus Christ is our power source, so we need to stay connected. Prayer is that life line, without which we can be left in the dark and cold of life. Prayer provides the power to overcome temptations, crisis, and struggles. It also gives us a way to praise and thank God for all the good things and times of life. Prayer satisfies our thirst for God's love and mercy and guidance.

Another resource in our life of faith is regular worship attendance and Bible study. These disciplines help prepare us for whatever may come in our life of faith. To ignore or slack up on either of these is to run the risk of "dead batteries" of faith when we need it most. Irregular worship attendance also means that when we need the faith and help of others of faith, we may not be able to receive it. Your attendance at worship is a gift of "presence" you give others who may that very day be needing "reinforcement" in the faith.

Lent begins February 10 with a special Ash Wednesday worship service. And during the Lenten season, along with our regular Sunday worship services, we will have additional worship opportunities with our Mid-week Lenten services. You can also sign up for the new Bible Study on Revelation. We all need to be very serious and disciplined about preparing for our life of faith. God has given us the necessary resources to keep our faith strong and ready for whatever life sends our way, but we must be disciplined in their use. Don't get caught ill prepared. Pray often, worship regularly, and read and study your Bible. Then you'll be ready for life's storms.

Council Highlights January 18, 2016

Congregational Council met on Monday, January 18 for orientation, election of officers, election to committees, team building, goal setting, and a brief business meeting. Pastor Lohr led members through a Bible Study on 1 Peter 2:9-10 and several get acquainted activities. As part of the team building, council members set the following goals for 2016:

- 1. To conduct a Capital Fund Campaign to raise seed money for the repaving of parking lots and driveways. (25% of bequest monies that will be used for this project needs to come from members.) The repaving of parking lots and driveways also includes installing lighting on the carved angel and the flag pole.
- 2. To plan and execute four social activities (one per quarter) for congregational members. Two of these events will highlight and affirm member's "gifts and ministries."
- 3. To complete the update of our congregation's Constitution and receive Synod's final approval.
- 4. To continue our congregation's participation in the Congregational Transformational Process, which began in 2014. This will help us discern the future for our congregation and its ministries.

Following the Goal Setting, Congregational Council elected the following officers:

Council members signed up to serve on the various committees, acting as communication links between committees and council.

Following the orientation, a brief business meeting was held. The following is a highlight of matters discussed and/or acted upon:

- Picked and approved counter tops for the ADA bathrooms
- Noted the visit of Bishop Dunlop of our Lower Susquehanna Synod on Sunday, May 1 and began making plans for that important day in the life of our congregation.
- Approved Music and Worship's recommendation to purchase 20 new choir chairs with wire book racks. Funds for this will come from Lyman Hainley's memorial fund monies and from Selma Hainley.
- Approved a member's request to use Neidamyer Hall for April 16.

Next meeting will be February 8.
