I love Max Lucado's style of writing. I may not always agree with his theology but he can really say things in a way that relate to my life. It's no wonder he has sold millions of books. Consider this excerpt from his book, "It's Not About Me".

"What does the moon do? She generates no light. Contrary to the lyrics of the song, this harvest moon cannot shine on. Apart from the sun, the moon is nothing more than a pitch-black, pockmarked rock. But properly positioned the moon beams. Let her do what she was made to do, and a clod of dirt becomes a source of inspiration, yes, verily romance. The moon reflects the greater light.

"And she's happy to do so. You never hear the moon complaining. She makes no waves about making waves. Let the cow jump over her or astronauts step on her; she never objects. Even though sunning is accepted and mooning is the butt of bad jokes, you won't hear ol' Cheeseface grumble. The moon is at peace in her place. And because she is, soft light touches the dark earth."

In this book Lucado explores what would happen if we accepted our place as reflectors of Jesus? I think you would agree that this is easier said than done for we love when the focus is on ourselves.

For from the time we were born the focus has been on us. Cry and the diaper would be changed or the bottle would be warmed. Stamp our feet or misbehave and we will get some attention. And as adults those messages continue to fill our ears in perhaps more sophisticated ways. They are about self-promotion, self-preservation, and self-centeredness. As Lucado states, "We have chased so many skinny rabbits that we've missed the fat one: the God-centered life."

I wonder if that may be true in our church and worship life too. That we concentrate on wanting what makes us feel good, on chasing those skinny rabbits of tradition and self-appreciation to the point of having a solar eclipse. That whenever we place God off-center in our lives we miss out on that fat one – God's abundant love for us. And in turn we miss opportunities to reflect that love to a world that is in need of love.


Shine on. Shine on harvest moon.....

God, our dwelling place

As a child, author Bob Saffrin was struck by polio, which paralyzed all four limbs and his diaphragm. Amazingly, he recovered use of everything but one arm. Following much questioning about why God would save him but not fully restore his body, Saffrin experienced peace. In *Psalms: The Sunrise of Hope*, he reflects on Psalm 91:

"The answer is to discover the presence of God in the middle of your circumstance. ... Then even though you go through distress, the distress won't go through you. ... If we dwell in the secret place of the Most High, and if we focus on the great character of God and make him our dwelling place, we can know that we are protected. How wonderful if he lifts us out of our suffering. But there is an even greater deliverance, one where he walks with us in our fight."

Sunday, 7th – Twentieth Sunday after Pentecost – Word & Sacrament – Thanksgiving for LWR Gifts – Healing Prayers following Worship

Texts: Genesis 2:18-24; Psalm 8; Hebrews 1:1-4; 2:5-12; Mark 10:2-16

This day's gospel combines a saying that makes many of us uncomfortable with a story we find comforting. Jesus' saying on divorce is another of his rejections of human legislation in favor of the original intent of God's law. Jesus' rebuke of the disciples who are fending off the children should challenge us as well. What does it mean to receive the kingdom of God as a child does?

Sunday, 14th – Twenty-first Sunday after Pentecost – Service of Word & Prayer – Led by the Worship Team – Weston Rudisill Speaker

Texts: Amos 5:6-7, 10-15; Psalm 90:12-17; Hebrews 4:12-16; Mark 10:17-31

The rich man who comes to ask Jesus what he should do to inherit eternal life is a good man, sincere in his asking. Mark's gospel is alone in saying that Jesus looked on him and loved him. Out of love, not as judgment, Jesus offers him an open door to life: sell all you own and give it to the poor. Our culture bombards us with the message that we will find life by consuming. Our assemblies counter this message with the invitation to find life by divesting for the sake of the other.


Sunday, 21st – Twenty-second Sunday after Pentecost – Service of Word & Prayer Texts: Isaiah 53:4-12; Psalm 91:9-16; Hebrews 5:1-10; Mark 10:35-45

This Sunday's gospel starts with disciples obsessing over who's number one, which leads Jesus to say something about God's take on importance and power. Here Jesus makes it explicit that the reversal of values in God's community is a direct challenge to the values of the dominant culture, where wielding power over others is what makes you great. When we pray "your kingdom come" we are praying for an end to tyranny and oppression. We pray this gathered around the cross, a sign of great shame transformed to be the sign of great honor and service.

Sunday, 28th – Reformation Sunday – A Polka Mass

Texts: Jeremiah 31:7-9; Psalm 126; Hebrews 7:23-28; Mark 10:46-52

Can we pray the way Bartimaeus prays? People try to hush him up because by addressing Jesus as "Son of David" he is making a politically dangerous claim that Jesus is the rightful king. Could our prayers ever be heard as a threat to unjust powers-that-be? Bartimaeus won't give up or go away quietly, but repeats his call for help more loudly. Do we ask so boldly? And are our prayers an honest answer to Jesus' question, "What do you want me to do for you?"
