In addition to enjoying ice cream and one another's presence, a thought to be explored at the Ice Cream Rally Day is "My Dream for Bergstrasse is..." I hope you will complete a "dream card" that shares your dreams for the future of Bergstrasse. Even though the Rally Day is now in the past, it is not too late for you to share your dream; it will be included on the dream board.

I would like to expand this thought. What is **God's dream** for Bergstrasse? To answer that question we need to hear God speaking to us. There are some key practices that can be used in listening for God's voice - listening to the community; listening to God; listening to each other; studying Scripture; and praying about it. The Bible tells of many and diverse ways in which God speaks to the people – a burning bush, in a still moment while hiding in a cave, angels, a woman who encountered Jesus at the town well, two people on a journey to Emmaus, a blinding light, to name a few. The point is God does speak to us in 2018.

I invite you to partner with God while dreaming about the future of Bergstrasse. In what ways do you see that God's presence might benefit your neighborhood or the larger community; what possibilities might emerge from there for Bergstrasse? In what ways have you experienced God's presence in times of worship; what possibilities might emerge from there for Bergstrasse? In what ways have you experienced God's presence while engaging with others here at Bergstrasse; what possibilities might emerge from there for the future? In what ways has God spoken to you during your personal devotions; what possibilities might emerge from there for Bergstrasse?

For example, what was God saying in the August 5<sup>th</sup> anthem *I Don't Know about Tomorrow*; as meals were served at the Ephrata Community Meal; during the funeral and luncheon for Larry Lausch; in the worship led by the Worship team; as the Tuesday crew put the fellowship hall back together; in transportation provided for a wife to visit her husband in nursing care; in the interviews with prospective pastors ?????

Yes, this is hard work. Here is a prayer that you may find helpful.

God of the future, you have a dream that we often struggle to see. Often you call, and we resist out of fear or blindness. Give us eyes to see what you are doing and faith to follow, even when we are not sure where you lead.

I look forward with great anticipation to hear what you and God together see as possibilities for this congregation.

# Lutheran World Relief October 7

The Stitches of Love group has been making quilts to be sent to Lutheran World Relief.

### We will be collecting school kits for Lutheran World Relief Ingathering.

We have some of the backpacks needed for the school kits. Bags may be purchased at Walmart, Target, sporting goods stores. They may not have any logos printed on them. We ordered some backpacks online and ask for a \$2 donation per backpack to cover the cost.

### Include the following items in each School Kit:

- Four 70-sheet notebooks of wide- or college-ruled paper approximately 8" X 101/2"; no loose-leaf paper
- One 30-centimeter ruler, or a ruler with centimeters on one side and inches on the other
- One pencil sharpener
- One blunt scissors (safety scissors with embedded steel blades work well)
- Five unsharpened #2 pencils with erasers; secure together with a rubber band
- Five ballpoint pens (no gel ink); secure together with a rubber band
- One box of 16 or 24 crayons
- One 2<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>" eraser
- One sturdy drawstring backpack-style cloth bag approximately 14" X 17" with shoulder straps (no standard backpacks)

**Do not add other items or leave out any of the items listed.** All items should be new and in good condition. Remove any excess packaging, pack all items in bag and close. Do not enclose the Kit or any of its contents in plastic bags.

The cost to handle and ship one school kit overseas is \$1.40. Please consider a monetary donation to help with this cost.

# Worship With Us September, 2018

## Sunday, 2<sup>nd</sup> – Fifteenth Sunday after Pentecost – Word & Sacrament – Pastor Glenn Beard presiding

Texts: Deuteronomy 4:1-2, 6-9; Psalm 15; James 1:17-27; Mark 7:1-8, 14-15, 21-23

Jesus protests against human customs being given the weight of divine law, while the essence of God's law is ignored. True uncleanness comes not from external things, but from the intentions of the human heart. Last week Jesus told us "the words that I have spoken to you are spirit and life." Now James says God has given us birth by the word of truth. We, having been washed in the word when we were born in the font, return to it every Sunday to ask God to create in us clean hearts.

### Sunday, 9<sup>th</sup> – Sixteenth Sunday after Pentecost – Service of Word & Prayer

Texts: Isaiah 35:4-7a; Psalm 146; James 2:1-10 [11-13] 14-17; Mark 7:24-37

James tells us to stop showing favoritism in the assembly, treating the rich visitor with more honor than the poor one. Jesus himself seems to show partiality in his first response to the Syrophoenician woman in today's gospel. Was he testing her faith in saying Gentiles don't deserve the goods meant for God's children? Or was he speaking out of his human worldview, but transcended those limits when she took him by surprise with her reply? Either way, the story tells us that God shows no partiality. Everyone who brings her or his need to Jesus is received with equal honor as a child and heir.

### Sunday, 16<sup>th</sup> – Seventeenth Sunday after Pentecost – Service of Word & Prayer

Texts: Isaiah 50:4-9a; Psalm 116:1-9; James 3:1-12; Mark 8:27-38

Three weeks ago we heard John's gospel's version of Peter's confession of faith. This week we hear Mark's version, when Peter says, "You are the Messiah." In John, the stumbling block is Jesus' invitation to eat his flesh, given for the life of the world. In Mark too the scandal has to do with Jesus' words about his own coming death, and here Peter himself stumbles over Jesus' words. But Jesus is anointed (the meaning of "messiah") in Mark only on the way to the cross (14:3); so we are anointed in baptism with the sign of the cross.

## Sunday, 23<sup>rd</sup> – Eighteenth Sunday after Pentecost Service – Service of Word & Prayer

Texts: Jeremiah 11:18-20; Psalm 54; James 3:13--4:3, 7-8a; Mark 9:30-37

This Sunday we hear James warn against selfish ambition, while the disciples quarrel over which one of them is the greatest. Jesus tells them the way to be great is to serve. Then, to make it concrete, he puts in front of them an actual flesh-and-blood child. We are called to welcome the particular children God puts in front of us, to make room for them in daily interaction, and to give them a place of honor in the assembly.

#### Sunday, 30<sup>th</sup> – Nineteenth Sunday after Pentecost Service – Service of Word & Prayer

Texts: Numbers 11:4-6, 10-16, 24-29; Psalm 19:7-14; James 5:13-20; Mark 9:38-50 Someone is casting out demons in Jesus' name who isn't part of Jesus' own circle, and the disciples want him stopped. They appeal to Jesus, as Joshua did to Moses about the elders who prophesied without official authorization. Like Moses, Jesus refuses to see this as a threat. Jesus welcomes good being done in his name, even when it is not under his control. The circle we form around Jesus' word must be able to value good being done in ways we wouldn't do it, by people we can't keep tabs on.

# Council highlights July 15, 2018

The church is still in need of someone to supervise the cemetery.

Pastor has created a pamphlet that presents the church and its mission to be given to visitors and prospective members and at church functions. Council approved the pamphlet and copies will be made.
