



2021 – No doubt a new and better year tops your wish list! The drop of a crystal ball or turning the calendar page will not be the answer to a better new year! My new year's wish....to continue to grow in our individual and collective relationship with a merciful loving God. A relationship that calls us to action centered in God's loving embrace to serve our neighbor. A call to action that moves beyond words to one that shares our talents and skills offering new life to persons beyond our walls searching for a greater purpose in life. A call to action more than sharing financial resources, that lifts up a physical presence to engage in support of our mission 'to widen the community of people who know, love and serve God'. Yes, our community is small in number; our commitment to love and serve God is greater!

2021 is the year for Bergstrasse to gather, pray, serve our future together. We are faced with situations that require us to wrestle with our being. A significant priority is for the care of our cemetery. It has been a few years since we've had a superintendent responsible for the details of marking graves, ensure graves are opened when needed, selling graves, etc. Recently, Jeremy Nolt, who dug the graves, took care of all these details asking for a minimal stipend. Jeremy's untimely death leaves us facing once again 'who will care for the cemetery?'

Secondly, is our financial situation. Our building and property are probably in the best shape they have ever been! For that we are grateful, but there is a cost to maintaining this level of care. Our resource pool, the fortyish persons engaged in ministry, struggle to support the property's demand. We were blessed to secure a contract to lease a portion of our space to JD Eckman staff working on the 322/222 intersection which added \$23,000/year to our income resources. Eckman's work will end late 2021. Additionally, in 2020 we received a federal loan of \$18,000 to help with staffing costs during the covid pandemic. This loan has been forgiven by the federal government, making it a grant. We also received an anonymous contribution to support our mission and ministry. Where will we find these additional funds in 2021 and beyond?

Thirdly, check out the article on Live Streaming in this newsletter. The desire is strong; who will commit to learning this new technology?

Do you know that some of the things we cherish most were developed during economic downturns? For example: 1) The world was a dark place before 1930, and not just because the Great Depression had hit the year before. Until that year, no one had ever eaten a **chocolate chip** cookie. But that year, Ruth Graves Wakefield accidentally created the recipe while baking for guests in her toll house. She ran out of baker's chocolate while making cookies and had to settle for cutting a chocolate bar into pieces. She assumed the chocolate would melt, but instead, it hardened into tiny chips. Her recipe eventually became the Nestle Toll House Cookie. 2) The game of basketball was invented in 1891 by Dr. James Naismith, a sports coach, but for the first three years, it was actually played with a soccer ball. Then in 1894, in the midst of a recession that lasted from 1893-96, Naismith encouraged A.G. Spalding to create a ball specifically designed for the new game. With few changes, this is the same Spalding ball you see on the courts today. 3) He may not be a household name, but Richard Drew is definitely the guru of adhesive products. In 1925, he invented the first masking tape. Then, in 1930, he introduced the first transparent adhesive tape, which was quickly rechristened **Scotch Tape**. Scotch Tape was an obvious winner from the start. Cash strapped folks around the country found many uses for the tape, using it to patch up clothing and fix up the house.

And since the 2008 recession 4) College friends Iqram Magdon-Ismail and Andrew Kortina launched digital payment app **Venmo** in 2009 as a way for peers to exchange cash digitally and without lofty transfer fees. 5) Entrepreneur Andrew Mason founded **Groupon**, a website that promotes companies by offering deals on their products and services to consumers, in the middle of the 2008 recession. 6) Businessmen Travis Kalanick and Garrett Camp founded **Uber** in 2009 after they couldn't find a taxi ride on a cold night in Paris.

What lies in store for 2021? A time to envision new life. Americans are known for their ingenuity especially during down times. It is in those times great minds come together to envision new paths. Bergstrasse is at a similar time. We are at a crossroad that demands our attention. Our Leadership Council is charged with visioning for our congregation; your support of word and action make it reality. Will you step up and out to be a part of the change?

Live Streaming at Bergstrasse?

What does 'live stream' mean? Live stream is a digital platform for people to view, hear, or both, an event that is being recorded 'live' in person by the presenters, usually without an audience, that is 'streamed' to your location. The event recording is then available for review anytime. Live streaming has made a huge significance for people to experience an event where being physically present is not advised in a Covid world. It also has the potential to reach more people than a pre-recorded worship, event or activity. I've been live streaming since moving to Ephrata instead of purchasing a cable subscription!

Congregations wishing to minister beyond their walls often implement Live Streaming into their ministries. The Live Stream event can be viewed on Facebook, YouTube, a website or a service that specializes in offering this service. *Is Bergstrasse ready to offer Live Streaming?* If Bergstrasse is serious about equipping others to know God in Jesus Christ, the answer is YES!

Recently, the Leadership Council wrestled with taking steps to invest in Live Streaming equipment (the approximate cost of \$5,000 is available from an anonymous donor). They were excited and ready to take the next steps – until, 'who will operate the equipment?' The desire, the funding source, are all available. But will (2-3) persons commit to learning and using the equipment so that ministry continues?

The Leadership Council seeks your input... Is Live Streaming important to sustain and grow our ministry? Remember Mary who heard a voice from Gabriel asking her to not be afraid to welcome the child she is about to bear is God's Son. Her reply, "Here am I". Who is God calling to venture beyond their comfortableness to engage in ministry in a new way? Your reply will be graciously received by any Leadership Council person or Pastor Jim.
