When I allow myself to stretch, I enjoy historical novels, non-fiction, biographies, and current events (current is relative!). Too often I start a book, set it aside, start another, set it aside...rarely completing any of them!

I recently finished "Unfollow" and "The Bible Tells Me So"

"Unfollow" A Memoir of Loving and Leaving the Westboro Baptist Church is written by Megan Phelps-Roper. It tells of her upbringing in the church in which her grandfather Fred Phelps made Westboro Baptist Church known around the world. Best known for their protests of military funerals, and their headline God Hates Fags. She tells her riveting story of growing

up thinking Westboro Baptist Church has the corner on God, and everyone else is out of touch with a ticket directly to hell.

"The Bible Tells Me So" Why Defending Scripture Has Made Us Unable to Read It chronicles Pete Enns's spiritual odyssey, how he came to see beyond restrictive doctrine and learned to embrace God's Word as it is actually written. As he explores questions progressive evangelical readers of Scripture commonly face yet fear voicing, Enns reveals that they are the very questions that God wants us to consider—the essence of our spiritual study. Pete Enns is the Abram S. Clemens Professor of Biblical Studies at Eastern University. St. Davids, Pennsylvania.

It was mid-March 2020, the world we knew best experienced significant change. Coronavirus, Covid-19, face masks, social distancing, wash your hands, quarantine, words we rarely used became part of our daily routine. An unseen virus was swirling among us, infecting unsuspecting persons. A year later, over 500,000 Americans have died; millions more affected; life routines changed; emergency declarations issued for our safety; questions about decisions made or not made; tempers flared; frustration set in. It has not been an easy year. Through all that was happening, we learned new ways to live. I imagine you adopted new routines that have become life giving. You might even call it a 'new normal'. I've learned that cooking for myself isn't too bad, and it's cheaper than eating out in a restaurant most of the time!

There is an understandable anxiousness to get back to 'normal'. You do know 'normal' only exists as a washing machine setting! Even there, I'm not sure what it means! Doing what is familiar from the past is comfortable, it requires less energy and perhaps offers a sense of instant gratification with little effort. As we look ahead, I wonder if it is healthy for Bergstrasse Church to return to the life we knew a year ago? EVERYONE has changed, life is different. What might the new Bergstrasse Community look like in the next year, two years, five years?

Surely your life has or is changing because of the effects of the coronavirus. I will be asking our Leadership Council and you to consider these reflection questions:

- 1. What positive experience did you have during the pandemic that you will continue post-pandemic? (For me, the efficiency of zoom meetings; online grocery ordering for pick-up)
- 2. What did you learn about yourself, good or bad, during this time of pandemic? (For me, trying new things is life)

Next, think about the same questions in relationship to our Bergstrasse Community. Here is what I've experienced about Bergstrasse –

- 1. Continue to grow our online/digital experience (Worship attendance online is THREE TIMES greater than in-person attendance); weekly written communications brought our community closer together, especially homebound persons; although we didn't meet in person regularly, many continued to participate in ministry opportunities; connections are important Shepherding Ministry
- 2. The Bergstrasse Community is open to try new adventures; cooperative ministry initiatives with the Holy Trinity community feel life giving.

It will be helpful if you share your insights with me so that I can let others know too! Your voice is important as we set goals for our future.

Change is hard. At the root of all change is loss of the familiar. Change happens all the time. I find two ways to approach change: 1. Let it happen, grumble, and eventually accept it or 2. Be proactive and part of the process to embrace change for the better. I can offer examples of both approaches to change in my life. Honestly, those where I was part of the process were the most life giving. I trust you too will be part of the change for our beloved Bergstrasse Community.


We are in this together is more than a hopeful phrase. Let your voice be heard.

# Easter Vigil – At Bergstrasse Campus

Saturday April 3, 7:30 pm - outdoors in The Grove & Sunday April 4, 6:15 am - outdoors at the Old Bergstrasse Cemetery Gate

In Christianity, especially the Eastern Orthodox and Roman Catholic traditions, a vigil is often held when someone is gravely ill or mourning. Prayers are said and votives are lit. Vigils extend from eventual death to burial, ritualistically to pray for a loved one, but more so their body is never left alone. For many Protestant traditions formed during the Reformation, they too adopted the practice of a vigil. The Easter Vigil as we know it today began in the 7<sup>th</sup> Century. During Lent, the early Christian Church prepared new catechumenates (confirmands) to be welcomed in the faith at the Easter Vigil. It is a celebration of 'new life' raised up at the community resurrection service.

The first Easter Vigils began at sunset Holy Saturday using the first known elements of life – fire, wind, water, earth. A new fire was set ablaze as teachers of the faith and new catechumenates gathered. I wonder if this was the forerunner of the practice that confirmands stand in front of the church council or leaders to state their beliefs? The beginning liturgy is a prayer service inviting participants to welcome the Holy Spirit (wind) into the setting. Next, the gathered people sit around the fire, with individually lit candles of their own, and listen to the stories of their faith – 13 in all shared in the oral tradition. Can you think of 12 key stories of the Jewish faith that shaped even our Christian heritage? (See answer elsewhere in this newsletter). You can be assured we'll hear less than 12 this year!!!



After the story telling, we move to the Rite of Baptism. Here new believers experience the refreshing waters of baptism. It was not unusual to have hundreds of baptisms – the Church was growing by leaps and bounds. People flocked to engage with a Savior promising new life after death. Eventually, the Church allowed baptisms to happen at other times too! Today, the Easter Vigil includes the Affirmation of Baptism rite for all persons. You can expect to get wet, or at least feel a few sprinkles. On a rare occasion, a faith community today will welcome a new follower into the fold.

Remember, all this started at dusk Saturday night.... As the new dawn peeks on the horizon, the gathered faithful prepare for the Resurrection Celebration. The Easter Proclamation is announced, "He is Risen, Alleluia!" and the liturgy continues with all the jubilation of color, light, sharing the story of the last three days, and culminating with the community sharing the Holy Meal. Are you ready for a 12-hour worship?! No need to worry. When my seminary liturgy class created an Easter Vigil, it lasted two hours and was held at Augustus Lutheran Church in nearby Trappe – the oldest Lutheran Church still in existence in Montgomery County!

This year, Ephrata Lutheran Ministry is offering an Easter Vigil Liturgy. It will include the elements of the ancient liturgy, held over two days. Overnight accommodations are NOT available! Both services will be held OUTDOORS on the Bergstrasse Campus. Saturday April 3, 7:30 PM as the sun is setting, we will gather around a bonfire in prayer, and hear the stories that shape faith in the Grove. A lighted pathway will guide you into the worship space.

We again gather Sunday April 4 at 6:15 AM, by the Old Gate on top of the hill of Bergstrasse Cemetery as dawn begins to break in the Eastern sky. Here we will affirm our baptism, announce the Easter proclamation, celebrate the Resurrection and share in communion. In my experience, the Easter Vigil is one of the most moving liturgies I've ever experienced. It is the backbone of our Christian identity – Gathering, Word, Baptism, Meal, Sending.

What you need to know as you participate in the Easter Vigil:

- 1. Both services are outdoors. Dress accordingly. Bring a lawn chair.
- 2. Social distancing will be practiced, and face masks are expected.

- 3. Communion will be with wafer only, again social distancing.
- 4. With your prayers there will be no rain or snow!!!! \*If you remember, Christmas Eve was outdoors in cars, during a down pour...we will adjust accordingly!
- 5. This liturgy requires the hands of many. If you are willing to help, let Pastor Jim know.
  - A. Traffic Control
  - B. Lectors
  - C. Brass Musicians
  - D. Set-up & Tear down running electric cords, chairs?, worship things
- 6. Due to Covid restrictions, we will not have breakfast following the service.
- 7. There will be an Easter Sunday worship later in the morning.

I look forward to worshiping with you as we Celebrate Christ's Resurrection.

# Bergstrasse Lutheran Church Council Meeting – Feb. 8, 2021

Present were Dave Wilhelm, Nevin Rutt, Peggy Rushton-Witmyer, Cathy Feather, Ben Gunzenhauser, Lisa Conway, Lynn Hibshman and Pastor Jim. Almanara Buffenmyer was absent.

Lynn reported that the average weekly giving was slightly less than usual and snow removal costs were incurred. Nevin moved to accept the treasurer's report and Ben seconded it. The motion carried.

Ben has composed a letter about our cemetery to be sent to Lloyd Smucker, Dave Zimmerman and Ryan Aument. It asks about the possibility of obtaining bequests to offset the cost of maintaining the burial site of Major Dick Winters and over 175 other veterans.

Gladys Horvath has agreed to keep our copy of the cemetery map updated to the match the Nolt's version when plots are sold.

Nevin made a motion to accept the secretary's report from council's January meeting and Cathy seconded it. The motion carried.

Peggy made a motion to accept Pastor Jim's request to mark \$3600.00 of his base salary toward his housing allowance for tax purposes. The motion passed.

Easter outside services are being planned for Saturday, April 3<sup>rd</sup> at 7:30pm in the Grove with a bonfire and for Sunday, April 4<sup>th</sup> at 6:15am for a sunrise service.

Online services with ELM continue to reach many people and combined musical contributions are being explored.

The North Lancaster HUB and Ephrata Area Social Services are working to obtain a grant to have a daytime center in the area. We'll explore the option to hold it at Bergstrasse.

The second floor of the office building adjacent to the Ephrata Public Library is getting crowded and some of the HUB workers may want to lease space here.

Pastor Jim is looking for interested candidates to help to record the Live Stream services.

Ben moved to adjourn the meeting and Cathy seconded it.
