

Coming Thursday evenings in Advent (December 1, 8, 15, 22)

Taize worship originated in Taize, France with an ecumenical Christian monastic community in 1940. Taize worship centers in a simple meditative song. The song may or may not include instrumentation, depending on the leader. (We'll likely use a piano!) The form of the meditative worship generally includes readings, silence, and personal reflection that offers the possibility for each participant to connect with their inner being. Our vision is to create a space that is warm and welcoming with candles or dimmed lighting. Participants may sit on a chair, on the floor on a mat.

Our vision is to create a space as described above in the Fellowship Hall. We intend to reach out to the greater community with a primary focus to persons engaged in twelve-step programs or persons who have been hurt by Church teachings that exclude people. We are aware some are anxious



to come into a church, more specifically a sanctuary, but will come into a fellowship hall space without the icon familiar in a sanctuary.

We are working with Stephanie Smith, the interim director of the Harrisburg Gay Men's Chorus who has led this type of service in the past.

November brings back fond memories of Thanksgiving; roast turkey, filling, mashed potatoes, sweet potatoes, peas, corn, pumpkin pie...Oh my! Always more food than any size gathering could possibly consume in one sitting, hence Thanksgiving leftovers are always the best! I don't remember a lot about family Thanksgiving traditions as a kid, except our visit to my uncle Terry and his family in Tennessee in 1971. My brothers and I were stuffed in the family station wagon ready to visit cousins we only knew by name. It was a different experience, but one that had an impact on my young life to better understand gratitude.

We arrived late and settled in our motel room for the evening. The next morning, we drove the short distance to my uncle's house where we met him, his wife Charlene, and our three cousins. I remember traveling on a stone road that seemed to go uphill forever. There was a dusting of snow on the low ground, but as we traveled up hill, the accumulation of snow soon amounted to an inch or two. It wasn't the snow that surprised me, it was Charlene's reaction as we entered their home. She was overcome with joy at hearing running water coming from the spigot in the kitchen sink. "Joy from a leaky faucet?", I thought to myself. Charlene was overcome with gratitude, that the new fallen snow began to melt and found its way to the pipe they had laid so that water would come to their house. I had no idea their house didn't have running water.

This was my first significant visit away from my home. They were also the only family at that time that lived more than a 30-minute drive from our home. I soon realized that although we shared ancestry, our lives were different. As a fourteen-year-old boy, who seemed to have everything I needed or wanted, I was surprised to experience a family that lived without running water whenever they wanted. I assumed everyone had access to running water. I began to wonder what else I might have, that not everyone else has access to. I soon became aware that not all lives are alike.

I began to see life differently after that Thanksgiving experience in 1971 by working to be more grateful for what is around me. Nurturing a grateful heart takes patience – to notice the small stuff; empathy – to sit with others life experiences as their own; time – set aside to offer thanks for all that is received. Admittedly, it is easiest to notice the material things for which to be thankful. I wonder how we might be more in touch with our living God to be grateful for the people in our lives.

This thanksgiving time, let us nurture our attitude with gratitude. Acknowledge the presence of a new person in your life or say thank you to someone who challenges your thinking or let someone know they matter because of their presence. Imagine how the world around you might change by giving thanks for the people who touch your life.





Lynn Hibshman reported that income is covering expenses at this time.

Nevin made a motion to accept the treasurer's report for September and Peggy seconded the motion.

Almanara made a motion to accept the secretary's report for September and Sandy seconded it.

Jeff Donahue provided numerous property updates pertaining to heating oil, thermostats, snow plowing, rodent control and window frames. One of the emergency safety lights is out of order. The cost to replace the cell is nearly as much as an entirely new light fixture with long-lasting batteries. Almanara made a motion to replace all four emergency lights and Sandy seconded the motion.
